IVymount

Ivymount School had a packed fall with a Back-to-School Night information fair, PTA family movie night, apple picking/baking and Halloween parties, plus music, theater and dance events through Ivymount's Integrated Expressive Arts initiative. We also welcomed part-time therapy dog, Lightning! In October, Ivymount School celebrated National Disability Employment Awareness Month (NDEAM) by recognizing the jobsites that help prepare students for adult life. The Aspire Applied program launched 17 new clubs, spanning topics such as cooking, dance, chess, robotics, anime, and an LGBTQ alliance club. They align with clubs in public schools and create diverse learning and incidental teaching opportunities to support skill generalization.



Several programs offered educational opportunities to families and the broader community. The Endeavors program established a parent training series for new families and other targeted groups on topics such as academic and behavior intervention. The Transition team provided two information sessions about adult services for families of students earning certificates. And the lvymount Professional Collaborative led webinars for caregivers and professionals on teaching sexuality education and on promoting positive transition experiences.

KTS has greatly benefited from a partnership with the Rotary Club of Rockville. During the summer of 2023, Rotarians started building a butterfly and native plant garden (and some vegetables), which resulted in the creation of a high school horticulture class. The garden is used all year round, and the students even planted vegetables such as lettuce in the winter. In the spring of the 2023-2024 school year, the Rotarians returned to KTS to expand the garden, including the addition of a raised bed with vegetables and herbs. The garden has been a big hit with the students with its applications to horticulture, biology, and culinary classes, and the school's PT has even used picking the grape tomatoes for strengthening a student's fine motor coordination.

This summer, Rotarian Chuck Woolery educated the high school students about invasive plants. Then, he led them in removing invasive wild growth in the area near the school, which enabled the students to help the environment and earn community service hours. We are extremely grateful for the Rotary's support and the ensuing opportunities that the garden connection has provided for the KTS high school students!

RICA

There's a new 4' x 16' mural donning the walls of RICA-Baltimore to commemorate the Harlem Renaissance and Civil Rights Movement in the United States. The artwork was produced by students in Mr. Robley's art class. Construction began in late January and was completed in early March with the help of many students and staff. The artists used mixed media assemblage of painted cut cardboard, paper, and fabric on two guarter-inch plywood boards.

Both artists contributed greatly to documenting the history of the black experience within the United States from emancipation through the Harlem renaissance and into the Civil Rights era. Arrow Center for Education - Hunt Valley

Senior Jaden M. is a student from The Arrow Center for Education located in Hunt Valley. Jaden applied for and was accepted to the CCBC General Motors ASEP program. This 2-year trade-based program is geared so that students earn their Associate of Applied Science degree. Students learn to repair newer model vehicles with classroom instructions and hands on training. Every student who completes the program has a job upon completion.

When asked if he was excited about his future Jaden stated, "if you had asked me before I came to Arrow if I would graduate, I would have told you no. I wanted to drop out to get away from school as fast as I could." He went on to explain that in the public school he felt like he couldn't learn, and he was embarrassed. When Jaden started at Arrow, he said he thought that it would continue to be the same story, but when he gave it a chance, things started to change. Jaden stated "All of the teachers teach us about strategies to calm down and to think things through. I learned that it is okay to get mad and this is the very important part, you do not have to keep getting mad. You can walk away, yell, or whatever, but walk away."

Jaden loves working with his hands and has planned to be a mechanic since Middle School. With the help of Ms. Dunham, the Transitional Coordinator, Jaden created a resumé, applied and was accepted to the CCBC Program. Jaden is scheduled to graduate in June 2025 and start the CCBC program in August 2025. We at Arrow Center for Education Schools are very proud of Jaden M. and his accomplishments. We wish him well in his future endeavors.

Candidates had to show improvement in self-regulation, have good participation in classes, and use their strategies to communicate and work collaboratively to win their campaign. We are so proud of all the candidates and their classmates who helped run a great campaign getting the whole school involved. All the candidates created platforms outlining what their stance was on homework, school lunches, and school culture along with what they would try to do to improve the student experience at ACE Riverside School. In their speeches the candidates explained why they would be the best candidate for the position, what leadership skills they had and why they had passion for their school. Pinning our students were our awesome teachers, Ms. Glassman and Mr. Riddick.

We can share a little more about one of our officers! Nehemiah is a well-spoken, charismatic leader in the classroom, and a skilled reader. Nehemiah will tell you that his teachers and staff at his old school never knew who he could be because they could not see the real him beneath his struggles. Nehemiah and his parents have expressed how excited they are that Nehemiah has made steady progress. Nehemiah's mother stated "My son is part of the school student government, and he takes his job very seriously. He completes his assignments with minimal prompting." His mom went on to express that several years ago this would not have been possible and that their family is so grateful that Nehemiah landed where he did.

Many times, we can lose sight of the little victories when compared to the big wins. For our students, being on a school football team is just a dream, something that seems unobtainable. Aiden wanted to play football but had difficulty when emotionally charged. Self-regulation, sportsmanship, and the skill of being coachable are concepts that are hard sometimes even on our good days, but Aiden had a goal of being on the football team and worked hard to get there! Aiden explained that the coaches told him that it is okay if you mess up, it is okay if things do not go the way you want but you need to keep trying.

At ACE Riverside Aiden was one of over fifteen students determined to meet his academic goals to be an Arrow Warrior! The ACE Football team played their homecoming game with Aiden actively as a part of the team. His family came out to watch the game because they were so proud of Aiden's determination, with all the little victories culminating in the big win of being a part of an athletic team. While the Arrow team got the win in terms of points scored, Aiden got an even more important win for himself!

Garrett K., 4th Grader, uses the bike path weekly - it provides him with a heavy work opportunity that is age-appropriate and super fun! Garrett bikes on the path safely, demonstrates good body awareness, and shows leadership skills by helping to clean up the equipment at the end of recess. The bike path is also a great opportunity for Garrett to practice response inhibition and force modulation skills as he is able to bike up a gradual incline and judge turning at sharp corners. Way to go, Garrett! The painted bike path, along with several vehicles (scooters, go-karts, etc.), were funded through The Ravens Foundation, Inc.'s PLAY 60 Grant.






St. Elizabeth School

Amos, a fourth-grade student, blossomed with his classes' Mindful Moment activities; particularly yoga classes. Amos often gets antsy towards the end of the day, sometimes to the distraction of others. He started asking for Mindful Moment breaks utilizing the yoga poses he learned. This resulted in him being much calmer and more engaged throughout the day.





He was recently honored as a recipient of the prestigious 2024 Maryland Association of Resources for Families & Youth (MARFY) Youth Achievement Award. MARFY is an association of private child caring organizations providing foster care and other services across Maryland. Fernando was one of only 20 students selected out of hundreds nominated!

Fernando will be graduating this year and looks forward to entering a trade school to hone his mechanical skills. When asked to describe his journey with us, he shared that, "RICA-Baltimore turned my life around by helping me learn how to focus on myself and not worry about the drama of others anymore." His advice to all students who may be experiencing adversity at any point in their lives is to "always find something that you love to motivate you instead of using or doing anything to calm your stress that is not good for you."
